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SBA Relief Available to Louisiana Businesses, Private Nonprofits, and Residents Affected by Tropical Storm Arthur

Low-interest disaster loans now available

WASHINGTON — In response to a Presidential disaster declaration issued June 30, the [U.S. Small Business Administration](#) announced the availability of low-interest federal disaster loans to Louisiana businesses, private nonprofit organizations, and residents affected by Tropical Storm Arthur occurring June 17-18.

The disaster declaration covers the Louisiana parishes of Avoyelles, St. Landry, St. Tammany, and Terrebonne, which are eligible for both [physical damage loans](#) and [Economic Injury Disaster Loans](#) from the SBA. Small businesses and most private nonprofit organizations in the following adjacent Louisiana parishes are eligible to apply only for SBA EIDLs: Acadia, Assumption, Catahoula, Concordia, Evangeline, Jefferson, Lafayette, LaSalle, Lafourche, Orleans, Pointe Coupee, Rapides, St. Bernard, St. Martin, St. Mary, Tangipahoa, Washington, and West Feliciana. The Mississippi counties of Hancock and Pearl River are also eligible only for EIDLs.

Businesses and nonprofits are eligible to apply for business [physical disaster loans](#) and may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace disaster-damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory, and other business assets.

Homeowners and renters are eligible to apply for home and personal property loans and may borrow up to \$100,000 to replace or repair personal property, such as clothing, furniture, cars, and appliances. Homeowners may apply for up to \$500,000 to replace or repair their primary residence.

Applicants may be eligible for a loan increase of up to 20% of their verified physical damage, for mitigation purposes. Eligible mitigation improvements may include insulating pipes, walls and attics, weather stripping doors and windows, and installing storm windows to help protect property and occupants from future disasters.

SBA's [EIDL](#) program is available to eligible small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, and private nonprofits — including faith-based organizations — impacted by financial losses

directly related to this disaster. The SBA is unable to provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers, or ranchers, except for aquaculture enterprises.

EIDLs are for working capital needs caused by the disaster and are available even if the business or private nonprofit did not suffer any physical damage. They may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills which could not be paid due to the disaster.

“Through a presidential declaration, SBA provides financial assistance to help communities recover,” said Chris Stallings, Associate Administrator of the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the SBA. “We offer disaster loans to homeowners, renters, businesses, and private nonprofits affected by the disaster.”

Interest rates can be as low as 4% for businesses, 3.625% for private nonprofits, and 2.875% for homeowners and renters, with terms up to 30 years. Interest does not begin to accrue, and payments are not due until 12 months from the date of the first loan disbursement. The SBA sets loan amounts and terms based on each applicant’s financial condition.

As soon as Federal-State Disaster Recovery Centers open throughout the affected area, SBA will provide one-on-one assistance to disaster loan applicants.
